2nd Grade Summer Reading Assignment

All students entering second grade will be required to read the following books:

- *Miss Rumphius* by Barbara Cooney (may be read together with a parent)
- One non-fiction book on a science related topic of interest to your new Monarch, at a reading level which is appropriate for her to read independently. Three suggestions of varying reading levels follow, but please feel free to choose from outside of this list.
 - o Ranger Rick: I Wish I Was a Sea Turtle by Jennifer Bové
 - o <u>DK Readers: Bugs Bugs Bugs!</u> by Jennifer Dussling
 - o National Geographic Readers: Great Migrations Butterflies by Laura Marsh

Journal Assignment Part One:

Writing in a journal is a great way to record your thoughts as you read a wonderful piece of literature. Purchase an authentic, bound journal with lines marked for writing. You will use this journal for this year's assignment as well as summer reading assignments for years to come, so be sure to take care of it. On the cover or the first page, write your full name and decorate it. Remember to do your best work and write clearly and neatly for each entry.

Create <u>one</u> journal entry for each book after you finish reading it. You will have a total of <u>two</u> journal entries about your reading.

First, write the title of the book and the date, and then complete the following in your journal for *Miss Rumphius*:

- Miss Rumphius uses her gifts to make the world a more beautiful place. Write about something you have done, or would like to do, to make the world more beautiful.
- Draw an illustration of your favorite part of the story.

Second, for your non-fiction science book, write the title of the book and the date, and then complete the following:

- Using complete sentences, share two facts about the topic you read about.
- Draw one illustration related to your topic.

Journal Assignment Part Two:

Read the following poems by Robert Louis Stevenson aloud: "The Cow," "The Land of Counterpane," "Singing," and "The Swing" (These poems can be found in *A Child's Garden of Verses* by Robert Louis Stevenson.)

Choose <u>one</u> poem to copy into your journal, memorize it, and be ready to recite it on the first day of school. As you copy your poem into your journal, pay special attention to your handwriting. You are free to use colored pencils, pens, or special markers to make your handwritten copy of the poem beautiful. Your summer reading assignment will be due on the first day of school and will be for a grade. Have fun reading!
